

# Comparability of the Census questionnaire in Northern Ireland between 2001 & 2011

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The information that follows gives an overview of the differences between questions asked in the 2001 and 2011 Northern Ireland Censuses. It complements what was previously published in "The 2011 Census of Population in Northern Ireland – Proposals" in March 2010. It highlights points to consider when comparing census outputs from 2001 with those being published for the 2011 Census. An annex to this report deals more specifically with the differences in the tables being published in 2011 and their equivalent in 2001 and the extent to which direct comparison is possible. This annex will be updated with each release of outputs.

Changes to the 2011 questionnaire came about as a result of consultation with key users and the topics included were those shown to be the most needed by major users of census information. Changes were also made to produce more reliable and accurate, good quality data. Significant change in society has taken place within the last 10 years and as a result new questions have been introduced to the census questionnaire as well as amendments to existing questions in an attempt to deliver more relevant statistics, for example the introduction of Civil Partnerships.

In the main, 2011 Census outputs will be comparable with those from 2001, and trends over time will be evident. The above mentioned annex further highlights where there may be issues with comparability in specific outputs.

The format of the report presents the 2001 questions alongside those from the 2011 census. Detail is provided around all the changes that have been made to the questions, for example, in the changes to tick boxes or routing of a question. Reasons are provided for the inclusion of new and the omission of previous questions.

A census has been carried out in Northern Ireland every decade since 1951 coinciding with censuses in the rest of the United Kingdom. However, this report deals specifically with the comparability of the questions asked in the 2011 and 2001 Censuses. It, along with the accompanying <a href="mailto:annex">annex</a>, outlines the impact on the comparability of the statistics that will be published. Details of comparability between the 1991 and 2001 Censuses are covered in <a href="mailto:chapter four of the Definitions volume">chapter four of the Definitions volume</a> from the 2001 Census.

#### Summary of Questionnaire changes from 2001 to 2011

#### Questions

As noted previously a number of new questions were introduced to the Northern Ireland Census questionnaire in 2011, twelve in total. These where:

- Accommodation design or adaptation
- Voluntary work
- Nature of health conditions
- Intention to stay in the UK
- Lived outside Northern Ireland
- Last country lived in
- Date of most recent arrival in Northern Ireland
- Passports held
- National Identity
- Main language
- English proficiency
- Knowledge of Ulster-Scots

Four previous questions were excluded from the 2011 questionnaire, these were:

- Availability of bath/shower and toilet
- Lowest floor level of household's accommodation
- Rooms of household accommodation located on more than 1 floor
- How many people work for your employer

In total the 2011 questionnaire had **59** questions, **14 household** questions and **45 individual** questions.

In 2001 the questionnaire had 46 questions, 11 household questions and 35 individual questions.

In 2011 those aged 16 and over answered questions 27 to 42 on the labour market topic where as in 2001 only those aged 16 to 74 years answered the equivalent questions (numbers 16 to 34).

#### **Enumeration Base**

In 2001 usual residents were self defined. The 2011 Census questionnaire was designed to guide the respondent through a more formal definition of a usual resident i.e. the questionnaire was more explicit, through the use of tick boxes and routing, who should be included in each response.

In the 2011 Census information has been collected and will be published on usual residents and short-term residents. This contrasts to the 2001 Census which only collected (and published) information on usual residents.

In 2011 a usual resident was formally defined as 'someone staying or intending to stay in the United Kingdom for 12 months or more.' A short-term resident is considered to be someone staying in the United Kingdom for 3 months or more but less than 12. This gives a wider enumeration base than in 2001. For further detail on how the questionnaire was developed you may refer to "The 2011 Census of Population in Northern Ireland – Proposals" and "Previous Census Events and Consultations".

A further comparability document will be published during 2013. This report will deal with comparability of the 2011 questionnaire across the UK and is being developed in conjunction with the Census offices in England & Wales and Scotland.
